Missional engagement?

The practical theology and ethics of 'good practice' for deacons in the Methodist Church in Britain

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Abstract

This contribution will explore the everyday practical theological reflections of deacons on their ministry as part of the Methodist Church in Britain. The Methodist Church in Britain's understandings will be set in a comparative perspective, locating these within the broad and controversial range of understandings of the diaconate which exist within Methodism and ecumenically. The presentation will show why deacons' ministry is so controversial, as it embodies many of the key theological, missional and ethical challenges facing the church in the current context. As deacons seek to connect forms of presence, service, discernment and witness within their work, whilst making connections and building relationships between diverse groups and seeking to enable others to engage in this work with them, they face many such issues and challenges. Drawing on findings from a major two year study, this presentation will reflect on deacons' responses to these issues and challenges, and explore what the wider Church might learn from them, as well as what might be learnt by setting these issues and challenges in a wider comparative perspective.
